KEA advocacy leads to anticipated meaningful changes to SB 181, the "Traceable Communications" Law

ince SB181 went into effect on June 27, 2025, Kentucky educators have raised serious concerns about how the law- which was intended to create transparency and safety in student communications —has instead caused confusion and fear of disciplinary action for simple, everyday interactions.

In response to those concerns, KEA President Joel Wolford, Vice President Jessica Hiler, and KEA staff have met

multiple times with Senator Lindsey Tichenor (R-6th District), the bill's sponsor, to share members' real-world experiences with SB 181 and propose practical solutions.

Changes Under Discussion

Based on KEA members' feedback and advocacy by KEA leadership and staff, Sen. Tichenor has agreed to consider making the following proposed changes to SB 181 during the 2026 legislative session:

- Redefine parent/family to include stepparents, step siblings, in-laws.
- Redefine qualified school volunteer to include only those who are in the school on a regular basis, not someone who attends a trip or volunteers for events intermittently.
- Exclude the following: virtual instruction; communication to/with a phone number provided by the parent; communication where parents are included (i.e. group texts chats that parents are included in); public social media posts, comments, likes, etc.; communications that arise from the use of commercial products or services; secure communication from a healthcare provider.
- Expand consent form language to allow one consent form to cover multiple teachers/employees/qualified volunteers for a single student. Every employee and volunteer would need to be listed on the one form the parent submits. Schools or districts cannot require a consent form from the parent as a condition for student participation in a team, trip or activity.
- Allow private electronic communication in emergency situations, but teacher/staff/qualified volunteers must disclose the communication to their district when the emergency passes.

Make some allowances for communication during a field trip or school sponsored activity.

These proposed updates are a direct result of KEA's advocacy and members' input. KEA leaders will continue working with Sen. Tichenor and lawmakers in the upcoming

legislative session to advocate for these changes and assure that educators' voices remain at the center of this issue.

"I chose the KY Rank Advancement Academy for my CEO for several reasons. First of all, this Academy is set up so that the tasks are directly integrated into my current classroom practices. I could easily work through the micro-credentials by adding to what I was already doing within the classroom. This model made the process much more manageable. Also, I was able to work through the program at my own pace. The micro-credentials were not set up like typical classes and classroom hours. Investing in the Future of Education—Yours and Your Family's

KEA is committed to supporting educators and their families, both in the classroom and also in their pursuit of higher education. If you or a family member are planning to further your education in 2026, don't miss out on KEA's scholarship opportunities.

All applications open Nov. 1, 2025, and close at 5 p.m. ET on Saturday, January 31, 2026. Go to www.kea.org to access the online applications.

KEA Presidents' Scholarships – Every year, KEA's 12 governance districts award scholarships to Active certified or ESP members in four categories:

- Rank I (hours beyond Master's)
- Rank II (Master's)
- National Board Certification
- Continuing education/advanced certification for ESP members

Up to \$1,000 is available from KEA per award, totaling **\$48,000** statewide. Committees in each KEA governance district review applications and determine the winners in each category. The number and financial amount of scholarships awarded can vary from district to district but will not be less than \$250 per winner.

Representative Paul Mason Memorial Scholarship – For any active or retired KEA ESP member or their children or grandchildren. This scholarship honors Kentucky House Rep. Mason's legacy of championing the less fortunate. The Kentucky Education Support Professionals Association (KESPA) Board of Directors will award at least one \$500 scholarship to an eligible applicant.

Marvin Dodson-Carl Perkins Scholarships – For KEA Aspiring Educator members enrolled in teacher preparation programs in Kentucky. The KEA MOVE Committee determines the winners. Awards range from \$500–\$1,000 per scholarship, totaling \$6,000 annually.

Marnel Moorman Scholarship – Honors KEA's first African American president. For high school seniors or college students seeking an education degree. Criteria include financial need, an expressed preference to enter the field of education, ethnic-minority status (preferred but not required), academic performance, is or will be a high school graduate, is seeking their first post-secondary degree. The KEA Diversity Committee selects winners.

Scholarship Award is \$1,000.

KEA-Retired Tom Denton Scholarship – For Kentucky college juniors, seniors, or MAT candidates entering for the following school year. Preference given to KEA Aspiring Educators with an outstanding academic record, financial need, students with family members who are KEA Active or KEA Retired members, and those planning to teach in Kentucky. Winning this scholarship does not exclude a student from receiving other KEA sponsored scholarships. The KEA Retired Selection Committee selects recipients. Scholarship Award ranges from \$800-\$1,000 annually.

The 2026 NEA Representative Assembly—the largest democratic gathering of educators in the world—will take place July 3-7, 2026, in Denver, Colorado. KEA will send a number of statewide delegates, based on our official membership count on January 15, 2026. If you're an Active KEA member, you can nominate yourself to serve as one of those delegates and represent Kentucky educators on the national stage. Members who are elected as statewide delegates will receive a stipend from KEA to offset the cost of traveling to the RA.

 Retired and Aspiring Educator members will elect their RA delegates in separate elections.

Active KEA members interested in running for the Ethnic Minority Director position must submit the official candidate declaration form in the Member's section of the KEA website at KEA.org. Candidates must be Active members of the association and must have been a member for at least two years immediately preceding the

Director at Large are asked to self-identify
their ethnicity in the application.




